Director's Note

I'm really pleased to return to Camden Fringe for a third time this year with our new devised show.

As with most of our shows, I had no idea which direction 'Article 10' would take. With hundreds of articles researched and many hours of debate, it's with all credit to our actors and assistant director, that we were able to create some real characters with which to throw into our imagined future world.

The initial reason for creating a show about freedom of speech actually came from a number of news articles about theatres and censorship - 'Bad Jews' had their poster banned by TFL, 'Charlie & the Chocolate Factory' producers re-wrote a joke in their script, and 'Exhibit B' was cancelled due to protests against its racial commentary. This is all as well as the widely-reported attacks on the Charlie Hebdo offices and subsequent international marches for free speech.

Freedom of speech is such a vast and interesting topic. Everyone I speak to seems to agree with the concept of Freedom of Speech but each person has different lines; 'I believe in freedom of speech but you can't say that!' I wanted to create a platform for people to think about what Freedom of Speech means to them. And what would a world without Article 10 (which protects Freedom of Expression as a human right) look like without this protection? After all, it might not be that far away.
